Pupils will be taught to:

Listening Skills

- listen carefully and respond with increasing appropriateness to what has been said, e.g. make a helpful contribution when speaking in a small reading group.

Following Instructions

- fully understand instructions with more than one point in many situations and independently seek clarification when a message is not clear.
- attempt to follow instructions before seeking assistance.

Asking & Answering Questions

- show that they are following a conversation by asking relevant and timely questions.
- answer questions using clear sentences.
- begin to give reasoning behind their answers when prompted to do so.

Drama, performance & Confidence

- speak confidently within a group of peers so that their message is clear.
- practise and rehearse reading sentences and stories aloud.
- take on a different role in a drama or role play and discuss the character's feelings.
- recognise that sometimes speakers talk differently and discuss reasons why this might happen.

Vocabulary Building & Standard English

Reading

Word Reading - Recognition:

Pupils will be taught to:

- continue to apply phonic knowledge and skills as the route to decode words until automatic decoding has become embedded and reading is fluent
- read accurately by blending the sounds in words that contain the graphemes taught so far, especially recognising alternative sounds for graphemes
- read accurately words of two or more syllables that contain the same graphemes as above
- read words containing common suffixes
- read further common exception words, noting unusual correspondences between spelling and sound and where these occur in the word
- read most words quickly and accurately, without overt sounding and blending, when they have been frequently encountered
- read aloud books closely matched to their improving phonic knowledge, sounding out unfamiliar words accurately, automatically and without undue hesitation
- re-read these books to build up their fluency and confidence in word reading.

Reading Comprehension

Pupils will be taught to:

- develop pleasure in reading, motivation to read, vocabulary and understanding by:
- listening to, discussing and expressing views about a wide range of contemporary and classic poetry, stories and non-fiction at a level beyond that at which they can read independently,
- discussing the sequence of events in books and how items of information are related.
- becoming increasingly familiar with and retelling a wider range of stories, fairy stories and traditional tales.
- being introduced to non-fiction books that are structured in different ways.
- recognising simple recurring literary language in stories and poetry.
- discussing and clarifying the meanings of words, linking new meanings to known vocabulary.
- discussing their favourite words and phrases.
- continuing to build up a repertoire of poems learnt by heart, appreciating these and reciting some, with appropriate intonation to make the meaning clear.
- understand both the books that they can already read accurately and fluently and those that they listen to by:
- drawing on what they already know or on background information and vocabulary provided by the teacher
- checking that the text makes sense to them as they read and correcting inaccurate reading
- making inferences on the basis of what is being said and done
- answering and asking questions
- predicting what might happen on the basis of what has been read so far
- participate in discussion about books, poems and other works that are read to them and those that they can read for themselves, taking turns and listening to what others say

- to listen carefully in a range of different contexts and usually respond appropriately to both adults and their peers.

Following Instructions

- to follow instructions in a range of unfamiliar situations.
- to recognise when it is needed and ask for specific additional information to clarify instructions.

Asking & Answering Questions

- to ask questions that relate to what has been heard or what was presented to them.
- to begin to offer support for their answers to questions with justifiable reasoning.

- to rehearse reading sentences and stories aloud, taking note of feedback from teachers and peers.
